First, Whooping Cranes are endangered because they are losing their habitat from gas and oil. And there are 536 whooping cranes left in the world. The lowest number of Whooping Cranes in the world was in 1941, there were 15 Whooping Cranes. Whooping Cranes live at least 22 years in the wild, perhaps 40 years old too. Since there are about 536 Whooping Cranes it could mean that they might go extinct before 2050.
